

DISASTER IN MOZAMBIQUE: FACT SHEET

What happened?

Near midnight on March 14th, 2019, Cyclone Idai made landfall on the coast of central Mozambique.

Cyclones are a familiar fixture of the seasons in southeast Africa, but the ferocity of Idai was startling. 600 people were killed in the storm, and nearly 2 million were displaced, injured, and put in situations of extreme need.

Just five weeks later, Cyclone Kenneth hit the same coast and tore through central Mozambique. Kenneth is the strongest cyclone to ever hit Africa. It is highly unusual for two cyclones to occur in the same season, let alone so close together. The result was utterly devastating.

The total death toll for both these storms in Mozambique and neighboring countries is over 1,000 people. Standing water throughout Mozambique has caused outbreaks of cholera and malaria. The UN has called this “the worst climate disaster in two decades.”


What was the response?

Initially, the international community rallied to the relief effort in Mozambique. But by the time Kenneth hit the coast, donated funds had dried up and the news media had moved on to fresh disasters. Tens of thousands of families remain displaced and in need, and fundraising efforts are still desperately needed to help people rebuild their homes, acquire essential medicines and healthcare, and rebuild infrastructure that will enable them to regain stability and independence from charity.

Climate Change, Poverty, & Black Lives

Storms like Idai and Kenneth are becoming more frequent, devastating, and deadly. This trend is almost certainly the result of climate change. Warming temperatures have increased the intensity of rainfall and rising sea levels have worsened flooding.

The victims of natural disasters around the world are disproportionately people of color, especially poor people of color. As the global climate changes, those natural disasters are bound to become more frequent, intense, and deadly, and poor people of color around the world are going to continue to pay a high price for the relentless industrialization of developed countries like the United States and others. It is not enough to donate money in response to these disasters — we need to do more to address the greed, avarice, and racism that are victimizing whole communities of people all over the world.
