- There are a decent amount of recycling bins around the church building.
- Wherever we found a recycling bin, we also found a trash can next to it.
- However, there were some trash cans that had no recycling bins next to them.
 - Recycling bins were much smaller than trash cans.
- Some but not all recycling bins had "how/what to recycle" signs on them. It would be helpful to have these signs on all recycling bins.
- It would be helpful to have direction signs that tell you where recycling bins are.

MANDATORY COMPOSTING COMES TO NYC

As you probably know, mandatory composting, per the Zero Waste Act, went into effect in all five boroughs on October 6. According to the Department of Sanitation, pickup will be once a week on your regular recycling day, and all compost must go into 55 gallon bins with secure lids. If you or your building did not already order a free bin by October 28, they can be purchased online on the DOS website,

Composting, the recycling of organic waste, provides numerous environmental benefits, including improved soil health and reduced greenhouse emissions, as well as the elimination of food for NYC's thriving rodent population. Once collected, the material goes to anerobic digesters, primarily at the Department of Environmental Protection facility in Greenpoint, where it is turned into renewable energy and fertilizer. In addition the Staten Island Compost Facility turns the materials into finished compost for parks and gardens. About 60 percent of the finished compost is sold to landscapers, and 50 percent is given to community parks, groups and residents. What goes in the bin: Onlyfood scraps, food-soiled paper and yard trimmings What does not go in: diapers, personal hygiene products, animal waste wrappers, non-paper packaging, and foam products.
