God and Gender Based Violence: A Womanist Theological Response

While black theology attends to race and feminist theology attends to gender, womanist theology is distinctive for its treatment of both race and gender oppression as theological problems and for its reliance on African American women's religious experiences as a source of theological empowerment.

This small group will explore how black women's traditions of protest, struggle, and determination for freedom inform the development of theological reflection. In a brief study of womanist theology, discussions will aim to show how womanist concerns for social justice are critical for deeper understanding of God and transformative action for God's people.

Jesus and Justice: A Bible Study For The Movement

This Bible Study is intended to root our justice work in faith and scriptural teachings, while nourishing participants spiritually and giving them an opportunity for fellowship and solidarity. In this series we will be looking at five major touchstones in the life and teachings of Jesus, and using each as a way to reacquaint ourselves with the Gospel and search out deeper ways of connecting ourselves to the missions the Holy Spirit uses the text to call us to.

Week 1: The Manger: The birth & asylum of Jesus

Week 2: The Mount & The Plain: The socio-economic & spiritual teachings of Jesus

Week 3: The Cross: The trial & execution of Jesus

Week 4: The Grave: The death & burial of Jesus

Week 5: The Road: Recognizing Jesus in our world

We will pair each lesson with hymns, prayer, and a focus on a specific MSJ ministry that connects our study to ongoing initiatives in the church. We hope you will join us for this time of spiritual sustenance & solidarity in pursuing our common call.

From Passion to Compassion to the Presence of the Divine Love: How to heal your broken heart and Give Birth to Yourself

This small study group is designed with an intention to inspire every participant to heal a broken relationship so that he/she can paint a future without the pain and disappointment of the past and thrive by shining a light into others' Voyage to Love. Three core questions the study group will explore: Why God, WHY? How to heal brokenness? How to sustain your soul's light?

"Love starts with passion of all kinds-- different levels for different relationships -- then, evolves into compassion and brings you in the presence of Divine Love" according to Billur Suu. A mother, a wife, a United Nations women's empowerment specialist, a yogini, a woman like every other woman, Billur Suu took her broken heart in 2015 and turned it into a Voyage to Love in 50 days around the world. She solved the mystery behind a broken relationship--indeed, a deep betrayal of trust -- and brought power and love back into her life.

Biblical Hebrew: Absolute Beginners
