

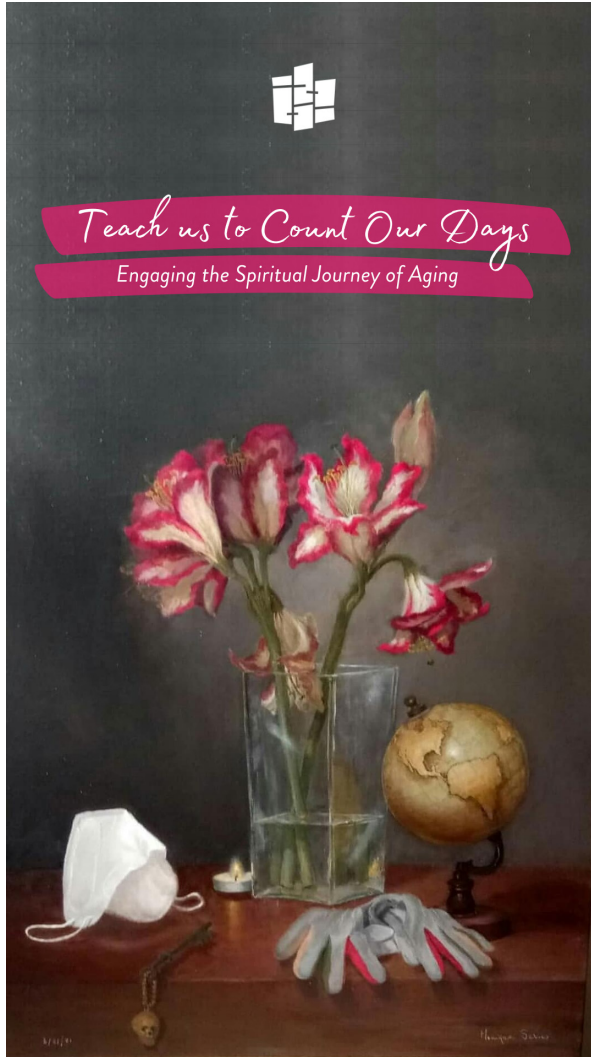

THE LITURGICAL YEAR

The Riverside Church follows the liturgical calendar to mark the seasons of our life together. We are currently in the season of Eastertide, a period of 50 days following the resurrection of Jesus Christ until Pentecost. The liturgical color of Eastertide is white, which symbolizes the hope of the resurrection, as well as the purity and newness that comes from victory over sin and death, as signified by the paraments and clergy stoles.

The **Rev. Dr. David Beckmann** has been leading faith-based advocacy with Congress for three decades. He was president of Bread for the World, a nationwide Christian movement to end hunger, and now serves as coordinator of the Circle of Protection, an advocacy coalition of church bodies and related organizations that include 100 million people. He is also Dean's Advisor for Political and Economic Justice at Virginia Theological Seminary. David was awarded the World Food Prize for his contribution through advocacy to the world's progress against hunger Center for Social Justice Advisory Board; member of the Center for Law, Brain and Behavior Advisory Board at Harvard University; and member of the COVID-19 "Roll Up Your Sleeves" Task Force created to ensure vaccine information and equitable access in Black and Brown communities.

Painter **Monique Serres** is an active member of The Riverside Church, including the Tower League. Monique joined the church in 1990, but has been involved since 1971. A native of Port-au-Prince, Monique is a graduate of Fashion Institute of Technology (Textile Design, Interior Design) and a life-member of the Art Students League. Her work has been exhibited in museums and galleries both in New York City and internationally, including West Side Arts Coalition, Cork gallery Lincoln Center, Hudson Guild Gallery, Marina Tsevetseva Museum, Moscow, Russia; Royal Canberra Show, Australia. The featured image in Riverside's Older Adult Series is Monique's "Still life on the pandemic," which speaks to the fragility and sacredness of life and the need to love and protect our neighbors during the pandemic.
